SUBJECT: COMPUTERS AND INFORMATION MANAGEMENT

AIMS AND PROGRESS OF SUBJECT:

Terms 1 and 2:-

- •Theory: The students learned of the history of the development of computers; the technicalities of present types of computers; the areas of human activities in which computers are used, with emphasis on business computing; the technological components used in computer processing and telecommunications; and the mathematics associated with computing.
- •Practical: The students received training in the skills required for the use of microcomputers; and the productivity packages of word processing, spreadsheets and database.

Terms 3 and 4:-

- •Theory: The focus of theory will be on the several types of Management Information Systems and their support of business management in its use of information for planning, problem solving and control, including aspects of security, computer crime, privacy and ethics.
- •Practical: Students will be trained to solve problems by designing programs in the Pascal programming language and successfully running these on microcomputers.
